

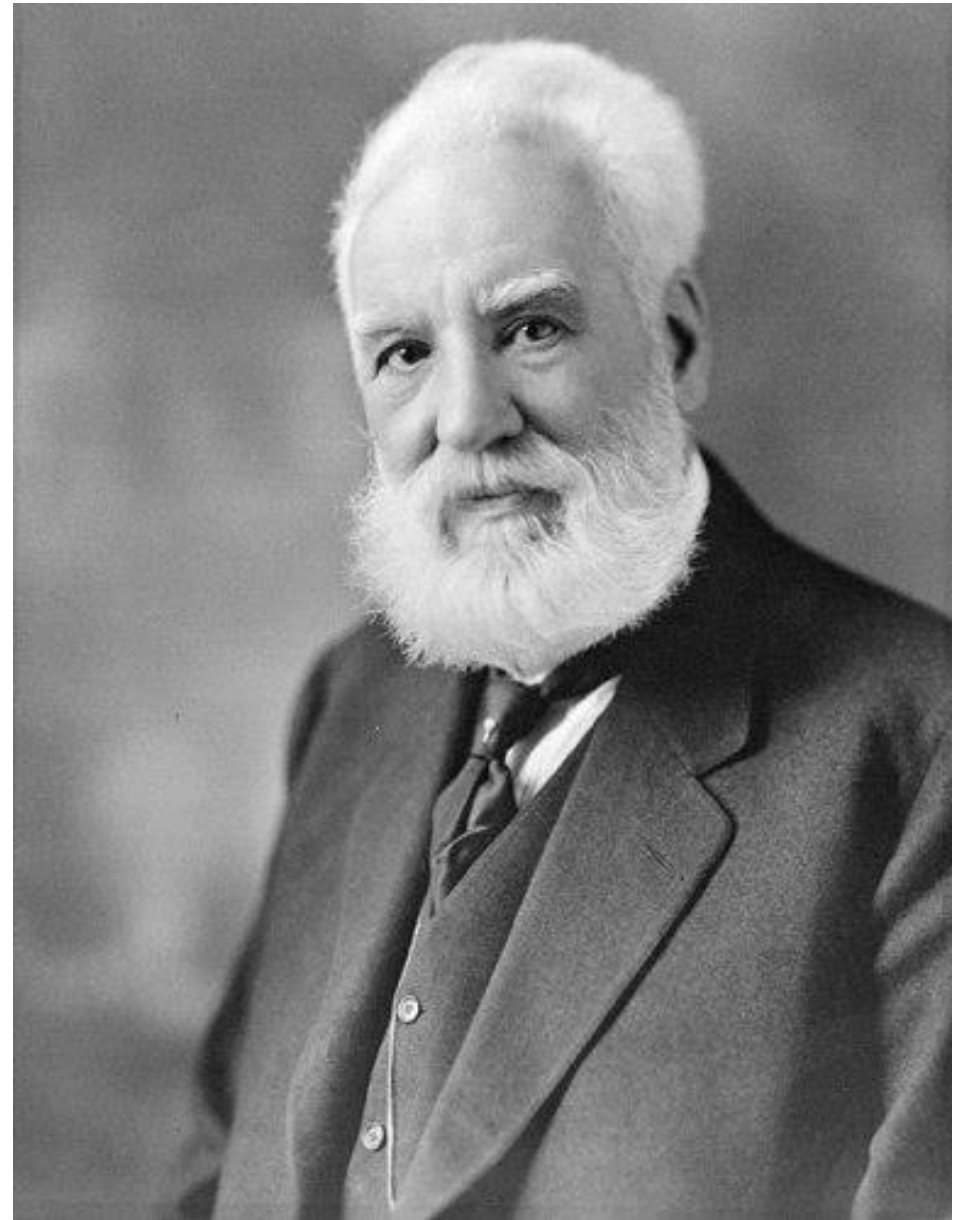

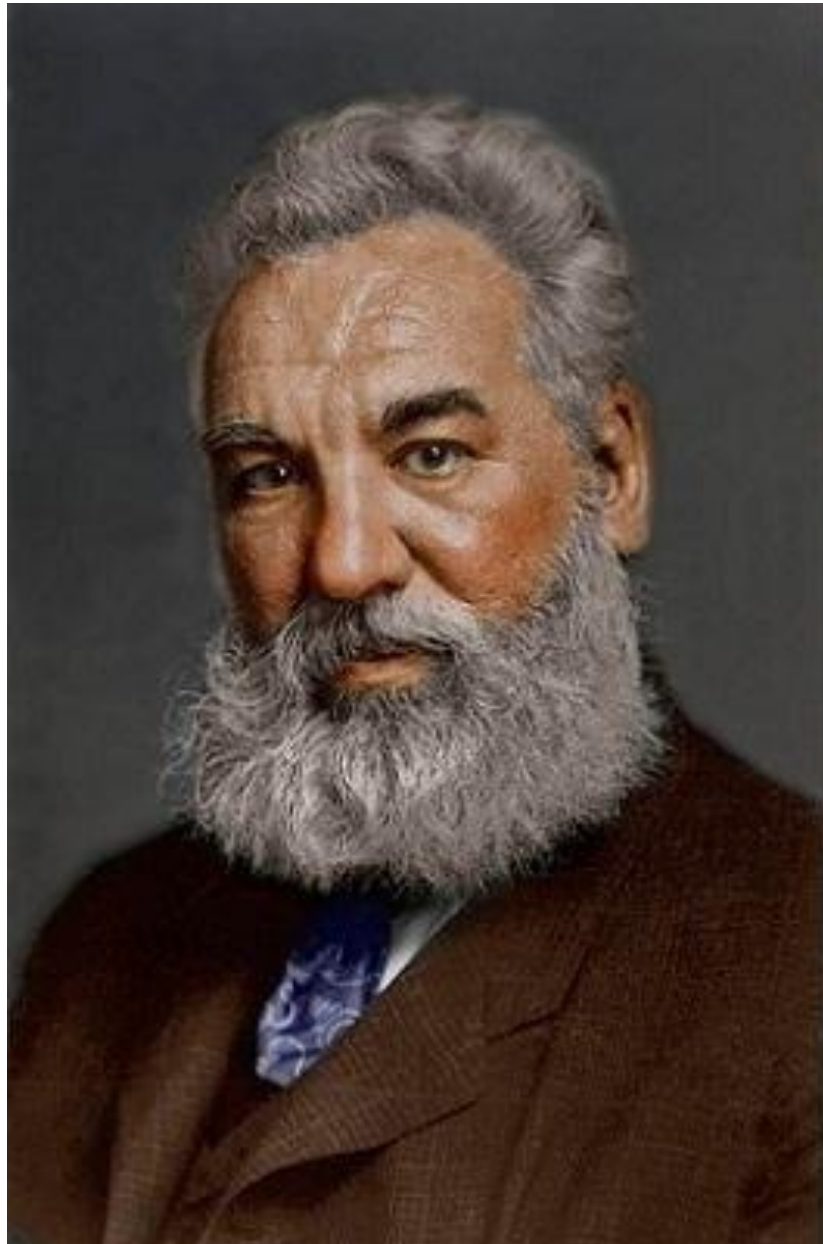
Alexander Graham Bell

Sir Frederick Banting

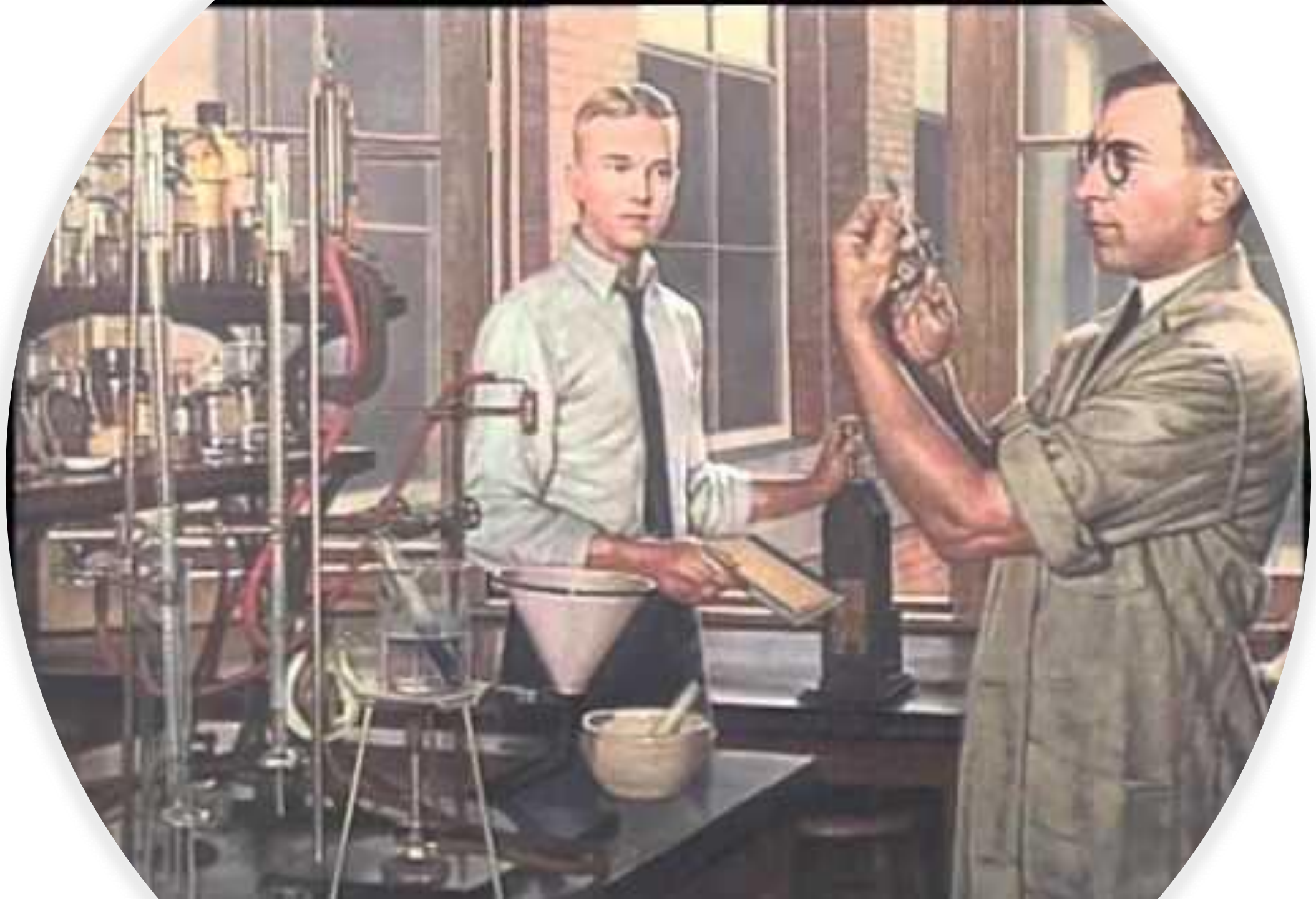
November 14,

July 27th 1921 marks one of the most important days in diabetes treatment history. On that date in 1921, Dr. Frederick Banting, a Canadian surgeon and Charles Best, a medical student, successfully isolated the hormone insulin for the first time.



**Marie Skłodowska
Curie**

7th November 1867 –
4th July 1934



Marie Curie founded the Curie Institutes in Paris and in Warsaw, which remain major centers of medical research today.

During World War I she developed mobile radiography units to provide X-ray services to field hospitals.



Marie's achievements include the development of the theory of "radioactivity", techniques for isolating radioactive isotopes, and the discovery of two elements, polonium and radium.

Under her direction, the world's first studies were conducted into the treatment of neoplasms using radioactive isotopes.
