To the Members of the Alzheimer Society of Ontario

he accompanying summarized balance sheet and summarized statement of revenue and expenses are derived from the complete financial statements of the Alzheimer Society of Ontario (the "Society") as at March 31, 2008 and for the year then ended. In our auditors' report on the complete financial statements, dated May 13, 2008, we expressed a qualified opinion because we were unable to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of fundraising revenue, as is common with many charitable organizations. The fair summarization of the complete financial statements is the responsibility of management. Our responsibility, in accordance with the applicable Assurance Guideline of The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants, is to report on the summarized financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements fairly summarize, in all material respects, the related complete financial statements in accordance with the criteria described in the Guideline referred to above.



FAST FACTS

- Alzheimer's is a disease that destroys vital brain cells. There is no cure. It gradually robs people of their memories, personalities, and ability to speak and take care of themselves.
- In Ontario, Alzheimer's is the leading cause of dementia in people over 65, accounting for 64 per cent of all dementias.
- Women are 50 per cent more likely than men to develop the disease.
- Dementia is the leading cause of disability in Ontarians over 65. It results in more years of living with a disability than stroke, heart disease and cancer.
- In 2008, 166,000 Ontarians over 65 have dementia. This figure is expected to more than double by 2030.



Financial and Operational Highlights

For the year ended March 31, 2008

 $oldsymbol{\mathsf{A}}$ Izheimer's disease is personal. It touches so many of us. Mothers, fathers, grandparents. Friends and co-workers. Thanks to donors like you, the past financial year has been successful on many fronts.

In 2007-08, strong response to fundraising initiatives allowed us to increase our research investment by 2 per cent and broaden our support to our member chapters. In fact, for every dollar raised, \$0.79 was invested in programs and services, research and revenue sharing with our member chapters, compared to \$0.75 in the previous year. Chapters deliver vital community-based services directly to people with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias, from respite care to family counselling.

We also looked closely at our fundraising expenses. This year, we spent \$0.14 per dollar raised, an increase of only \$0.01 and still well within acceptable fundraising guidelines. We kept our administrative costs low, increasing only \$0.02 to \$0.11 per revenue dollar.

Thanks to funding from the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care, we expanded our First Link program, connecting newly diagnosed people with appropriate care, education and resources in more communities. Additional funding also allowed us to augment our Alzheimer Knowledge Exchange, a powerful online tool linking physicians, personal support workers, health care providers and public education coordinators in a multimedia network that shares best ideas and practices. We also introduced a Strategic Investment Fund to improve operational efficiency across Ontario. Spending the time and money to look at how we can work together better will continue to reduce the proportion of revenue spent on administration and fundraising, and increase the dollars available for research, programs and services.

With your support and commitment, the Alzheimer Society of Ontario can continue its pursuit of a cure for our families and friends now, and for future generations.
